THE BEAUTIFUL PAIN: FOOTBALL'S MOST TATTOOED PLAYERS WOULD FACE £158,000 BILL TO REMOVE INK

· Football's 10 most tattooed players would have to spend more than £158,000, over a period of

70 years collectively, to remove all of their body art

Former Chelsea and Liverpool midfielder Raul Meireles would have to spend nearly £26,000, and

50 hours over a decade, to remove all of his tattoos

Danish footballer Daniel Agger would need to fork out £19,000 for 56 sittings in the tattooist's

chair over a nine-year period to return to his former ink-free image

· David Beckham last week commemorated the year 1999 with another tattoo - but to remove his

entire collection would cost him £18,300 over eight years

Over the past year enquiries for tattoo removal from UK patients have nearly doubled (up 94%)

- and over a third of searches (36%) came from those aged 25-34

Thursday 30 July 2015 – They are known for having some of the highest salaries in the world, which is

just as well considering how much it would cost for some of football's most inked players to remove

their tattoos, according to new research by private healthcare search engine, WhatClinic.com.

WhatClinic.com analysed the body art of the 10 international footballers most notable for their tattoos

and found that – should they ever regret going under the needle – it would cost them almost £158,000

collectively to turn back the clock. Combined, the removal procedures would require 455 individual

sittings, taking 342 hours over a period of 70 years.

Portugal's Raul Meireles, and former Chelsea and Liverpool midfielder, was seen flashing his

impressive full-length leg tattoo earlier this year, but removing his entire tattoo collection would set

him back nearly £26,000. Because it's necessary to wait at least eight weeks between removal

sessions, which normally last around 45 minutes, Meireles wouldn't have completed the treatment

for 10 years.

Danish defender Daniel Agger boasts an impressive array of artwork across his body. Also a former

Liverpool player, Agger's tattoos include the initials of the club's iconic song, 'You'll Never Walk Alone'

across the knuckle of his right hand. But should he regret this homage to his previous club, along with

his other tattoos, he would have to part with £19,000, and spend 42 hours across a period of nine

years in the tattooist's chair.

David Beckham is known for covering his body with tributes to his loved ones, with new tattoos just

this year including the words 'pretty lady' on his neck in tribute to his daughter, and the number '1999'

on his hand to commemorate both the year of his marriage and Manchester United's historic Treble.

To turn back the clock on his famous tattoos, Beckham would have to fork out £18,300, and spend 41

hours under the laser. And it would take him a total of eight years to achieve a blank canvas.

Swedish striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic hit headlines earlier this year by tattooing the names of 50 hungry

people helped by the United Nations World Food Programme onto his body. The names were applied

as temporary tattoos around his existing pieces of body art - but to remove his permanent tattoos

would still cost more than £17,000. With the Paris St-Germain player being one of the most highly-

paid players in international football, reported to have taken home £50 million last year, he might not

feel the pinch.

Although a tattooed torso might still be very much in vogue for these football stars, enquiries through

Whatclinic.com for tattoo removal from UK patients have nearly doubled (up 94%) in the past year,

with the cost of removing a small, black and white tattoo starting at around £400 per session.

Those looking into tattoo removal are similar in age to these heavily-inked footballers, with over a

third of searches (36%) made by those aged 25-34 - the highest proportion of any age bracket. Over

a third (35%) of all traffic to the WhatClinic.com site as a whole comes from men, but, in the case of

tattoo removal, male searches make up 41% of traffic in the UK, revealing a striking number of men

proactively looking into the procedure.

The following table, based on average costs provided by tattoo-removal specialists, estimates the

number of laser sessions and the total cost for the following international footballers to have all their

tattoos removed:

Emily Ross, director of WhatClinic.com, says: "There are lots of reasons why we change our minds about tattoos. A great piece can fade, our bodies can change over time, or like Johnny Depp or Melanie Griffiths, we no longer want someone's name on our arm! Luckily there are ways to help, but removal methods are not perfect, not painless, and not cheap! It's unlikely that you will wipe away all traces of the tattoo. In fact, removing the tattoo can hurt more and cost more than the original work. Our advice? Think before you ink. As with all elective treatments, make very sure your practitioner is qualified and experienced. Read reviews and seek out other patients for independent feedback when making up your mind."

Wayne Joyce, co-founder of London-based tattoo removal specialist, Reset Room, says: "The time needed to remove a tattoo, as well as the chances of eradicating all traces of the design, varies from person to person. Skin type, the colour and location of the tattoo, scarring and the degree of density will all make a big difference.

"The introduction of advanced laser technology has meant that the treatments are now more

expensive - but requires fewer sessions and produces faster results than those given by older

machines.

"Although the average customer won't be wanting to remove footballer levels of ink, most people

don't realise that removing tattoos properly can take months or even years, because laser sessions

should be around eight weeks apart to get the best results and minimise the risk of scarring and other

side effects."
